# Family retraces father's footsteps

Netherlands liberation retold through trip

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More than 77 years ago, Linda Webb's father, Paul Maurice Blanchet, marched through the Netherlands alongside thousands of fellow Canadian soldiers to liberate the country during the Second World War.

Webb and her two children – Julian Webb and Helen Webb – recently got to follow in their father and grandfather's footsteps, seeing the path he and thousands of other Canadians took in the name of liberation as part of the In Our Fathers' Footsteps trip from Sept. 7 to 19.

For Webb, the biggest takeaway was gaining more insight into what her now late father experienced during the war.

"Over there I had his diary with me ... there were so many things and places that we touched," she said. "Really having more of a feeling of what it was like and having more love for him and for what all those men faced."

The Webb family was the only New Brunswickers to go on the In Our Fathers' Footsteps trip, with other families coming from Nova Scotia, Ontario, British
